



Editorial

The Summer Show (formerly called the Flower Show) was held at the Eagle in late August. Which is why this is being reported in the October edition of In Touch. As the article inside this edition says, the whole event was very successful and raised over £1,300 for village funds, which is an incredible amount for a small village. A lot of this was down to the skills of the auctioneer, Rod Beckwith, and the generosity, and rivalry, of the bidders. There is a slight possibility that bids were rather higher than expected, because the auction was held in the pub. A full list of cup winners is in the report inside, but the overall winners were Fred Younger and Sabrina Davey, with the scarecrow winners being Fred Skipp and Harriet Carter. Congratulations to the organisers and helpers for a fantastic effort.

The rainfall, or rather, the lack of it this year, has been astounding. Up to the end of August this year, we had 188.6mm of rain. This compares to last year's 552.0mm for the same period. To put it into context, in the month of August 2020 alone, we had 210.8mm, which is more than for the whole first 8 months of this year. As the total for each year mostly works out roughly the same, we could be in for a very wet remainder of the year.

Changing Seasons and Clocks.....

As a child, I struggled to understand both how and why we changed the clocks twice a year. How could we alter time? Wasn't time – just

time? How could we mess about with it, and decide that what was 8.00 am was now 7.00 am?

It wasn't until I was much older, that I understood that the whole notion of measuring and naming 'time' had been a human invention.

Calendars for reckoning intervals of time, and clocks for measuring its passage, have a long history. Did you know that first calendars were lunar? There's evidence of them from as

long as 6,000 years ago. The first clocks were a form of sundial, found in Egypt, so clearly humans have long felt the need to track the passage of time.

From a human perspective, time is linear and goes in one direction. But what could happen if we were freed from this constraint has long captured writers' imaginations, some even exploring the idea of being able to travel back in time, or even jump about in it.

But what about God's time? I believe that there has never been a time when God wasn't, and there will never be a time when God isn't. That God is revealed within time because humanity and creation is.

Starting with Abraham, God promised that through his descendants, all creation would know God's blessing. Some thousands of years later, and 2,000 years distant from us, God revealed Godself in human flesh, in the person of Jesus, a human being born in a specific place at a specific time.

So, as we move through the month of October – and yes, the days are shortening and Christmas is getting closer – let us take some time to marvel at the changing of the season and what it brings, always remembering that through each season, our own time, and how we use it, is precious.

Witchcraft in Hockham Proving of a Witch

As All Hallows Eve approaches, perhaps we should reflect on an application that was made to a magistrate and reported on in several newspapers in 1856/1857.

It was made by a farmer who farmed 40 acres in the Hockham parish.

The farmer thought his wife had been bewitched by someone referred to as Mrs C, an elderly lady who lived near The Lion, by Hockham Green.

He said she had the character of being a witch and he asked for permission for her to be "swum". It appears he wanted to see if she didn't sink, and if she floated, then she must be a witch. The intention was to get the police to surprise her with an arrest, tie her clothes about her legs, put a line round her waist and one to each side and take her to a local pit and if she did sink, the ropes could/would save her from drowning after giving sufficient time to see she didn't float. Apparently, it was a tried and tested way of revealing a witch in other places in the country, though it suggests the fact the matter made it to so many newspapers, that it was somewhat outdated.

So beware, if you see an elderly lady standing outside in the street near the Lion on Halloween, Mrs C may just have come back for a haunting!

Anyone wishing to verify and get the complete story online, then search for "Hockham Witchcraft" or "Hockham Hocus Pocus" and see what you find, and should you subscribe to a newspaper search website, then check out just how popular the story was. The original story was from that tried tested and impartial newspaper, The Times, from Nov 1856.





Clematis (Part 2) Some thoughts on the choice

Ask about how to grow clematis and you'll usually be told: 'Plant with their heads in the sun and roots in the shade'. Oh, and according to the variety, you might be given a 'Pruning Code' 1, 2 or 3, each of which simply says how severely to prune and when to do it. As far as it goes, that's sound advice and generations of gardeners have got by with it, particularly when aided by a favourable aspect and suitable soil.

More detailed advice was often felt to be complicating the subject, but that's to miss out on some fairly simple guidance that will help the gardener understand their plant and its needs. It will also help to get the best out of a genus that can be remarkably long lived, is undoubtedly showy and, depending on variety, can flower in almost every month of the year. In amongst those varieties are climbers, scramblers, herbaceous clump-formers and others which will very gently thread their way through the thickest of shrubs, and sprinkle their flowers in the supporting foliage of their hosts. Truly a plant for most places and, as we shall see, almost all seasons.

Clematis hail from every continent which will support plants. Australasia gives us some small, white-flowered evergreens, N. Africa, the winter-flowering semi-evergreen Clematis cirrhosa, although the mainly European viticella can be found there too. N. America provides its native texensis, from which the truest red hybrids derive, and the odd herbaceous species – douglasii is one that comes to mind. Clematis montevidensis (Argentine Goat's Beard) is a South American species which is rarely seen in cultivation elsewhere.

Europe has a fair share of species: viticella (known from Elizabethan times as 'The Virgin's Bower') is the best known and has been used repeated in hybridisation, of which more in a minute. The only indigenous British species is vitalba, the 'Old Man's Beard' of our hedgerows here, which is tough, though in comparison to its much showier cousins a nondescript plant, until its blowsy, silvery seedheads cheer us up in the autumn and early winter. That's been hybridised, by the way, with the herbaceous Asian heracleifolia. to produce the rather labyrinthinely-named: x joiniana 'Praecox'. Forget the name, it's quite a well-behaved non-climber. It will

scramble a good few metres through your shrubs or borders but, being non-clinging and far more refined than its UK parent, it won't try to strangle its hosts in the process. The flowers are small, recurved, with a bluish tinge but it doesn't produce fluffy seedheads or viable seed — maybe a blessing if you don't want it to be as promiscuous as its dad.

The *alpinas*, and the closely allied macropetalas are very hardy and come into flower in the spring, with pink, bluish or white flowers (some varieties are doubles) like ballet dancers' skirts. The flowers are especially welcome after the gloom of winter and, as you might expect with its high-altitude name, are resistant to being seared by any late frosts.

The real powerhouse is undoubtedly SE Asia, particularly in the SE ranges of the Himalayas, extending into China. Early European plant hunters found dozens of species, both climbers and herbaceous, that were seized upon and hybridised by nurseries over here, producing many of the cultivars (varieties) that are in common cultivation, even now.

These include the mighty *montanas*, which will, when happy, virtually take over your garden, chrome-yellow tanguticas and orientalis, flowering continuously from May to November (it's mid-May as I write and mine here is showing its first flowers of the season). Herbaceous heracleifolia, with masses of small, scented blue flowers, each one resembling hyacinth florets. And finally, the 'large-flowered hybrids', which show off the Asian discoveries' sheer size of blooms to such great effect.

These are too numerous to list (with dozens of new ones being added to the lists every year), but the old favourites include 'Nelly Moser' 'x jackmanii 'Superba'. 'The President', 'Ville de Lyon', and 'Marie Boisellot' (syn: 'Madame le Coultre') in their number. In a move bizarre to most people, the last one underwent an identity crisis way back in the 19th century when Marie Boisselot got married to Monsieur le Coultre and the plant's name changed too.

And if you really want a clematis with flowers the size of dinner plates? Well, 'W.E. Gladstone' is feted as the largest large-flowered clematis, with flowers 10" across. I've grown it in the past – if only to see that I could – and, yes, its reputation is well deserved.

MINUTES OF A PARISH COUNCIL MEETING HELD ON MONDAY SEPTEMBER 8TH 2025 AT 7.30PM IN HOCKHAM VILLAGE HALL

Attending; councillors Bennett, Lambert, Wiltshire, Thoams, Lloyd, Leech and Loft plus 11 members of the public.

- 1) Apologies for absence; District Councillor Cowen
- 2) Declarations of interest; Councillor Lambert as owner and landlord of the eagle and Trustee of the Woodsford Charity, Councillor Wiltshire as a trustee of the Woodsford Charity, Councillors Bennett and Loft as allotment holders and Councillor Leech as a farmer at Little Hockham.
- 3) Requests for dispensation; None
- 4) Minutes of July 28th 2025 had been circulated and were unanimously approved.
- 5) Progress Report;
 - a) Dog fouling signs were all in place now and a new dog bin had been installed at Church Lane. The clerk would inform SERCO.
 - b) Info Board. In progress
 - c) NCC Highways report following visit organised by F Eagle. Signs for Puddledock Lane from the A1075 were considered adequate, the verge at Little Hockham Lane would be cut and added to the schedule, village parking issues were commented on Cllr Eagle would provide some signs, A1075 restricted access they were considering what to do, the bat box was available but needed to go on public land, the bus stop for Puddledock Lane would be looked into further, the trod would be priced for resurfacing and drainage was discussed in depth.
- 6) **Public Participation**; Residents of Breakwell Close voiced their concerns at the potential of properties being built behind theirs. Safe access was mentioned as well as utility, noise and privacy concerns. It was asked if the road by the pub, could be one way.
- 7) County and District Councillor Reports; The clerk read a report from the district councillors. Breckland Council were preparing a submission to counter the NCC submission for a change of status re unitary authority. Three district councils were working together on this proposal. NCC were to vote to see if to appoint a mayor or not. Some villages had been having waste collection issues which were temporary issues due to staff sickness.
- 8) **Highways & Road Safety**; Cllr Thomas had three items to report, the verge at Litle Hockham Lane had been sorted, a damaged sign on the A1075 had been reported and a damaged 30mph sign near the school had been reported.
- 9) Planning; there were discussions about a document from Breckland that suggested agreed sites to go forward in the local plan. It should be noted that this is not a decision that has been made yet as neither have housing numbers. Alma House application PL/2025/1184/HOU was discussed and comments agreed to send. The councillors would object unless the wording of the application were changed and the old barn for the residents use only. Sunny nook PL/2025/1149/FMIN was discussed. It was felt this was still overdevelopment in a conservation area with insufficient parking space. It was

suggested the plans were inaccurate regards distance from an outbuilding. There was no delivery material plan.

Comments would be put together and sent in.

Enforcement at the turkey shed site on the A1075 was discussed. Sheds had been demolished but no plans had been agreed for the rebuild that was taking place. The work had been stopped by enforcement.

- 10) **Finance**; The end of year external audit had taken place with one comment regards the asset register. It was odd that the auditors had made a comment about 23/24 figures which were plain to see. There was £24,202.43 in the bank with payments due of £193 for clerk's salary and £45.60 for Pearce and Kemp. The latter would be considered for direct debit. N power payments were expected at end September after a 7-month delay. £277.49 had been received from the bottle bank.
- 11) **Allotment's:** Cllr Bennett had investigated grants for water supply and had been advised by the lottery fund of the right application form. The clerk would ask the estate about a potential borehole. Cllr leech said he could release land with the estate's permission in 2027 for more allotments if required.
- 12) **Footpaths and Rights of Way.** Cllr Loft had walked most routes and other than the trod felt all was ok.
- 13) **Playing Field.** Cllr Lloyd explained that the Summer Show had grossed around £1300 and thanked all for their efforts. The containers were being racked and shelved. Fireworks was next up on November 8th. Volunteers would be needed. Financially the clerk reported £15589.31 in the bank with outgoings of £430 and the cash from the Summer has yet to be banked. The electricity supply was in credit by £329.35. The clerk asked for permission to instigate online banking and for approval for the playing field committee to consider a card reader for the fireworks. All agreed.
- 14) **Community Car Scheme**. A grant of £500 had been approved to cover taxi fees if a driver were unavailable. The clerk would liaise with taxi companies. David Sumbler was doing an excellent job, and the scheme was very much appreciated in the community.
- 15) Forest Edge Court; Nothing to report that had not already been covered.
- 16) **3 Year Plan**. The laptop deal with Currys had fallen through, the clerk would investigate more deals.
- 17) **Councillor Update's**; Cllr Bennett asked about ways to smarten up the village. This would be followed up next meeting.
- 18) **Correspondence**. A letter from the East Anglian Air Ambulance requesting funding was considered. The council had not budgeted for any donations.
- 19) Next meeting was Monday 13th October at 7.30pm


