The Season of Advent.....

As a priest, I believe in a God of love, healing, compassion, peace,

and reconciliation, that the Church exists for all, including those who are not members of it. Many come to church in times of need, sorrow, joy and thanksgiving, to receive what they can through the loving ministry of people of faith, to discover God's presence, comfort and peace in their lives. But whether we have a faith or not, are interested to know more, or enjoy the moment for what it holds for us before it is gone, this time of the year speaks to us of hope, promise, relationship, goodwill and love.

The season of Advent, that leads to Christmas, offers the opportunity to engage with the meaning of Christmas and allow ourselves to reflect on the reason for the season as we embrace traditions and memories of past Christmas school nativity plays, carol singing, visiting Santa and those with whom we have spent (and may continue to spend) Christmas Day. Advent points to this beginning when God, taking on human flesh, comes to earth, being born in poverty to become a homeless refugee, in order to identify with the suffering, the poor and vulnerable, as well as the powerful and influential.

Christmas celebrates God's gift of life being shared and offered for all people. The exchange of our presents, greetings and celebrations with family and friends, are reminders of God allowing us to see the image of the divine every time we look into one another's eyes and notice friend and stranger.

We are all familiar with the story of the birth of Christ and all who were part of it, the ordinary people who did extraordinary things through the invitation, encouragement and will of God. The Epiphany - the visit of the Magi, the Wise Men, symbolises the sharing of the light of God shining into the darkest places of people's hearts and lives. It offers hope and reassurance that nobody would ever feel abandoned or rejected, if we love our neighbours generously, courageously, compassionately and without condition, wherever they are in the world.

May the peace of the Christ child bring hope to you and the world this Christmas. *Vanessa*. *x*

Rev Gordon Webster

Xmas on Hockham Green

Since the mid 1960s there has been a decorated tree on Hockham village green at Xmas. For many years it was a tree whose provenance was never delved into too deeply and there are many stories that tell of the time when the sourcing of the tree was a somewhat swashbuckling and daring Sunday morning adventure. Sophie Shaw driving a massive tractor with a 40 ft trailer (assisted by her dad) is one image that will never be forgotten. Sophie was about 10 at the time!

Santa and Rudolph were there from the very start and we estimate that this year they will be 60 years old. They have both had makeovers over the years, Cees de Ruijter did so once and the last time they came back looking bright and new from "Joe Garrod's Repair Shop", and they both still hang proudly from the chestnut tree branch, with a multitude of lights and a special red nose for Rudolph!

The LED tree lights have over 900 small bulbs, having replaced the old 100-watt multi coloured bulbs of yesteryear and on the day when the team have put the lights on, we always sneak back in the evening to take a good look to see how well the tree has been covered. One unwritten rule is that the tree must be seen from the A1075 bypass and it will do so again this Xmas!

There is also a chance for anyone to put a bauble on the tree to remember a loved one, though we recommend removal in the New Year for safe keeping, in fact there is a very large silver glass ball placed near the top that has the words "Absent Friends" on it, so we don't forget those that are no longer with us and played their part. It's very important.





At the invitation of the Parochial Church Council, attendees enjoyed coffee, tea and cake at The Eagle PH afterwards.



An Autumn Spring Clean (or not)?

As I write (in early November), we're into that midautumn time when the annuals should be rootedout, the leaves have almost finished cascading from the deciduous trees and many gardeners have an overwhelming urge to 'tidy-up'.

And you may think that's as it should be: A tidy garden is a disease- and weed-free one, it's more productive, balanced and manageable, isn't it? The planet will thank me for filling my brown bin on time and to the brim (I know people, not a million miles away from here who actually jump into their 'full' bins to be able to cram more into it - you know who you are!) Or, if you're really conscientious about saving resources, wish to feel virtuous and want to keep up with the Jones's — or in this case, Monty Don on 'Gardener's World' - composting it all yourself.

But should you?

After all, dear Old Mother Nature has got by for aeons without strimmers, leaf blowers, compost bins and various 'must-have' aids, like chemical compost accelerators, why should we know better? Well, in some cases we obviously do. Left to herself, Nature will very quickly turn your garden into a wilderness of her favourite plants (aka 'weeds') which will depend on your soil, aspect and climate — in this area, amongst other unmentionables, it's brambles and ground elder. She needs help, sometimes a firm hand, but also an understanding of what's good for your garden, and what isn't, if you're to have anything worthy of the name.

Take pruning: Lots of gardeners (me included) can't wait to sharpen up our prized secateurs and scalp that overgrown rose bush as close to its base as possible. After all, that'll give it so much more scope to grow and flower next year, won't it? Well, yes it will, and maybe a 'Bovver Boy' cut is what it needs. Maybe, but not just yet. If you prune it severely in early autumn, in all one go, chances are you'll only leave two or three dormant buds on each stem. If you then encounter a mild spell in (say) Jan/Feb, those buds are <u>all</u> likely to break dormancy. If that's followed by a killing 'Beast from the East' frost in March you'll lose those buds but you'll not have any below them that can take their place.

The way to guard against this, with roses, and quite a few other plants that can break dormancy prematurely, is to prune in two stages: Firstly, in autumn remove all leggy, sappy or otherwise weak growth, ensuring you have reduced the size of your plant and effectively streamlined it against winter gales. If you don't, you can get a bad case of 'wind rock' (!) which is the technical term for a plant dying because the base or the roots have become damaged or diseased, following perpetual buffeting in strong winds or because they've become top heavy after being loaded with snow (and don't think we'll not get more of that in the future). This 'twotier pruning' leaves plenty of 'sacrificial' buds below the cuts you've made, that can shoot prematurely before winter is properly over and be subsequently killed by frost in a late cold spell. When you, and the Met Office are satisfied there'll be no more horticultural 'frosticides' you can prune back to where you always wanted to do.

The other *bete noire* of mine is the mania for defoliating all herbaceous plants, sometimes when autumn's hardly begun, often by chopping them right down to ground level. There, job done, you think. Just clean, tidy, bare earth with a few short, stubby brown stalks to show where your prized plants are. Or, in some cases after a hard winter, were.

In this case, Nature *does* show us the way: That dead foliage really has a purpose. It protects the crown of your plant from the worst of the winter frost, desiccation in icy winds and predation by those poor hungry critters who, usually in the dead of night, are only trying to find a juicy morsel to keep body-and-soul together until spring comes back again. It also prevents clod-hopping gardeners like me forgetting where I've planted things and then trampling them into oblivion whilst working on the flower bed, or digging into them, thinking I had an empty space where I could put my wonderful new acquisition.

That last one is unforgivable, but old habits die hard and it still causes me grief every single year.

MINUTES OF A LOCAL PLAN MEETING OF HOCKHAM PARISH COUNCIL ON MONDAY 10TH NOVEMBER 2025 AT 7.30PM IN HOCKHAM VILLAGE HALL

Attending; Cllrs Bennett, Thomas, Wilshire, Lambert, Lloyd and Leech, the clerk C Garrod and 17 parishioners

- 1) Apologies for absence; Cllr Loft
- 2) Requests for dispensation; None
- 3) **Declarations of interest**; Cllr Bennett as an allotment holder, Cllr Leech as a farmer at Little Hockham; Cllr Lambert as owner and landlord of the Eagle pub and a trustee of the Woodsford Charity, Cllr Wiltshire as a trustee of the Woodsford Charity.

Everyone was advised to list their concerns and things they agreed with too. The clerk agreed to attempt to find why plots 226 and 110 had been discounted. The Larling and Roudham sites were also discussed.

The next meeting was a full council meeting on Monday 24th November 2025.

MINUTES OF A MEETING OF HOCKHAM PARISH COUNCIL HELD AT 7.30PM ON 24TH NOV 2025 IN HOCKHAM VILLAGE HALL

Present; Cllrs Lambert (meeting Chair), Lloyd, Wiltshire and Thomas, District Councillor P Cowen, Clerk C Garrod and 8 members of the public.

- 1) **Apologies for absence**; Cllrs Bennett, Loft and Leech The chair confirmed the meeting was quorate.
- 2) **Declarations of interest**; Cllrs Wiltshire and Lambert as Woodsford Charity Trustees and Cllr Lambert as landlord and owner of the Hockham Eagle.
- 3) **Requests for dispensation** were given to Cllr Lloyd for a planning application and Cllr Lambert for an item regards a wedding.
- 4) **The minutes of the meetings** of 13th Oct 25 and 10th Nov 25 were approved and signed.
- 5) Progress Report.
 - a) Info board. With Cllr Bennett.
 - b) Drainage. NCC Highways commissioned a sludge gulper with the highway engineer present. Many drains were sucked out and attention given to the drains by the eagle and on Watton Rd near the green. The former appeared complex and needed more work; the latter were found to flow to a pond on the edge of Kingshill. The owners had been asked to do some maintenance to jeep the culvert free flowing.
 - A drain on Vicarage Rd was inspected but emptied two days later. It was now full again. NCC confirmed they inspected but did no other work.
- 6) Public Participation. The meeting was adjourned to hear questions from the public.
- 7) Councillor Reports: Councillor Cowen gave a description of the local plan and the current consultation. All were encouraged to send in their own feelings about the document and particularly the Hockham allocated site.

 He also spoke about devolution and potential mayoral elections in 2026, and the local government reorganisation which was also in consultation. He gave a very eloquent resume of his own personal insight into the matters.

 There was no County Council Report.
- 8) Highways and Road Safety. The matters reported were up to date.
- 9) Planning; Chiltonwood PL/2025/1700/HOU. No objections. Sunnynook had been approved subject to conditions. Cllr Cowen agreed to look into why the conditions had not been listed online. Brookside Poultry Sheds. It was noted vehicle movements could increase dramatically and that the site was next to a SSSI. Comment ideas would be circulated by councillors.
 - **Local Plan consultation:** Councillors would get together to discuss comments for the consultation. A mail drop would be considered.
- 10) **Finance**; There was £29,341.13 in the bank, the new container had been paid for. It was agreed to pay Pearce & Kemp £45.60 for November and December, the clerk's salary of £193 for November and December. PAYE and N power were on Direct debit, N Power were up to date and the October invoice was £74.25.

- The precept was unanimously agreed at £18250 for 26/27. This would give sufficient surplus for some investment.
- 11) **Allotments.** A figure of £8500 had been quoted for a borehole. This was considered a no go.
- 12) **Footpaths and Rights of Way.** The trod refurbishment had been quoted at £15000. This was considered excessive. The clerk would see if the old agreement was still available to view maintenance responsibilities.
- 13) **Forest Edge Court.** It was reiterated that the clerk would contact the new bus company in January.
- 14) **Playing Field**. Thanks were conveyed to all who assisted at the fireworks. The profit margin had been very good and the reports on the fireworks display were excellent.
 - It was agreed to try and get a grant for a 3- phase play equipment scheme with the playing field and parish council putting in equal proportions of £2500. If the grant failed, then £5000 would be taken from each pot to fund equipment.
- 15) Councillor Updates. None
- 16) Correspondence.
 - a) Concerns had been sent to the clerk regards the potential for Wretham Camp to be accepting asylum seekers. Our local MPs were aware and were investigating.
 - b) Grants. Lorraine Varney from Breckland Council was assisting in grant works.
 - c) Wedding on the green. It was agreed a wedding could be held on the green in February 26. A donation to a village charity would be requested.
 - d) The clerk discussed that as a new regular village hall booking would be on Monday evenings when no PC meeting was on, that emergency meetings would be more complicated to arrange. It was agreed to circulate meeting dates till Dec 26.


