

Local Plan Update from Breckland Council

Due to the government's massive increase in housing target of 45% (from our locally designed number of 625 to 903 dwellings per annum), we paused our review of the Local Plan late last year. After careful consideration of our next steps, we decided to initiate a new call for sites to restart our review process. The call for sites concluded on 28th April 25, resulting cumulatively in over 400 submissions across various categories including residential, commercial/industrial, gypsy and traveller accommodation, renewable energy, and local green space to support our Local Plan (Plan period has to cover Apr 24 – Mar 42, 18 years).

Our planning policy team has developed an interactive map, colour-coded to indicate different site uses. It includes overlays showing ward boundaries, flood risk areas, and land earmarked for road improvements and solar farms. This map is accessible on the Breckland website and is accessible to the public at https://www.arcgis.com/apps/mapviewer/index.html?webmap=06a5294b7c654f95a7a3d0855193 ed36

Community involvement is crucial as we move forward with the plan. We are organising a series of meetings over the next month, particularly targeting Parish and Town Councils. These meetings have been redesigned from previous formats. A hybrid meeting was held on 20 May to update all Parish and Town councils on our progress and what lies ahead for the successful conclusion of the Local Plan process.

In addition to her inheritance, Libby learns who her birth parents were, about their unusual death and what happened to her older siblings.

It concentrates on the key family members, and it was suggested that some of the supporting characters could have been given more attention. Two ancient dustups in Wretham

As you travel towards Thetford between the Nature Reserve and the level crossing the location of two ancient battles is on the right. The more famous one was fought on 5th May 1010, fifty-six years before the Norman conquest of 1066. This engagement was called the Battle of Ringmere and although there have been attempts to place it south of Thetford, from the limited information available and references to a mere, I am firmly of the opinion that it was fought in Wretham. Who fought the battle? A Viking raiding party led by the splendidly named Thorkell the Tall which had sacked Thetford was attacked by an avenging

Saxon army led by a nobleman named Ulfcytel. The two main sources that provide a record of the battle: the Anglo-Saxon Chronicles and the Old Norse Sagas concur that it was not a great day for the Saxon army in general as most of them, including Ulfcytel ran way after a few minutes. However, the above Chronicles mention that the Saxon men of Cambridgeshire bravely held their ground and did not flee but stood firm and were slaughtered by the Norsemen. Even the Saxon king's brother-in-law died on the battlefield. The Vikings, after their victory, went on to plunder Oxfordshire and Buckinghamshire before sailing back to Scandinavia.

In 1004, six years before Ringmere, there had been a smaller, less well-known engagement fought on Wretham Heath which has been referred to by some historians as the 'Battle of Thetford'. At that point a Viking army under Sweyn Forkbeard which had sacked Thetford and was returning to longboats moored in Norwich found themselves confronted by a Saxon army, led by the same Ulfcytel on Wretham Heath. The Saxons did better on that occasion, because although their army failed in their attempt to stop the Norsemen reaching their vessels they won praise from the Vikings for the ferocity of their fighting, although neither side was able to claim a victory.

The next time you pass through the quiet village of Wretham bear in mind that it wasn't always so tranquil!



Launceston Immigration Aid Society

In 1853 a Reverend Benjamin Drake was invited to Van Diemen's Land (Tasmania) and at the meeting he attended, the Launceston Immigration Aid Society (LIAS) was formed. Tasmania needed experienced farm workers and Drake knew that those in the Eastern areas of England were deprived, with large families, low wages and would need to be spoken to about the LIAS as most could not afford a newspaper. (In Hockham newspapers were read aloud at Parliament Lane to those gathered there, and they were read the affairs of Parliament hence the street name).

Drake returned to Eastern England and began a recruitment drive amongst the local villagers. Anyone agreeing to uproot and head to Tasmania were granted free passage, a sum of money and some land when they got there. The journey was into the unknown, first to catch the appropriate boat and then to sail with few stops. So, Rev Drake recruited and took 335 immigrants on the Whirlwind ship arriving in Launceston, Tasmania, literally the other side of the world. Further ships took more passengers, the Southern Eagle and Trade Winds ships being but two.

Locally the numbers who were recruited were large and the following table shows the immigration effect.

We can only imagine what hard times people were having, when 9.4% of this village up and go into the unknown, with a promise they did not know would be kept. Rev Drake must have been highly believable. Promises were kept.

Sadly, ships conditions were not good and not everyone made it to Tasmania, however there are

still families with connections to Hockham who have relatives in Tasmania and there is a museum there dedicated to those who made the trip.

There is insufficient room to explain the complete story, but what brave souls these people were.




