

'Remember, remember, the fifth of November!'

I have fond memories from my childhood of Guy Fawkes Day. Each year my brothers and I would make straw effigies, known as Guy, before carrying them around our neighbourhood in a wheelbarrow whilst shouting

"penny for the guy", in the hope that we'd earn enough to buy sparklers. The annual firework display was held on the Hadleigh Salvation Army Farm Colony in Essex, where we enjoyed the sight of a large, crackling bonfire, and a colourful display of noisy fireworks which would be a

source of fear to some children. Treats like roasted chestnuts, marshmallows on sticks, and toffee apples were also a popular part of the celebrations.

These days, Bonfire Night - or Guy Fawkes Day is mostly about getting together with friends and family around a big bonfire to watch fireworks. But the roots of this centuries-old tradition are much more than an evening of sparks and illumination, they are a story of rebellion, religion and riot. Historically, it commemorates the failure of the Gunpowder Plot of 1605, during which a group of Catholic conspirators attempted to blow up the Houses of Parliament. Led by a man called Robert Catesby, the group of 13 conspirators united in their anger at King James I for failing to support greater religious tolerance to Catholics, whose freedoms had been oppressed by Protestants. But the conspirators' plot was never to come to fruition. An anonymous letter informed the Parliament of the group's radical plan, resulting in guards being placed on alert. On the day of the plot, Parliament guards discovered Guy Fawkes with a rather incriminating fuse on his person! All co-conspirators were either killed resisting capture, or tried and executed. This included Guy Fawkes.

Some say that Bonfire Night's spiritual significance stems from two main sources: the ancient fire rituals with meanings of purification and protection, and its modern interpretation as a celebration of freedom and resistance against tyranny and injustice with a desire for liberty and democracy. The Church of England highlights the need to respond to human need by loving service, and transforming the unjust structures in society. But whilst there is a deep need for those things, I also pray that we don't become like the embers of fire which float outside of our bonfire's heat and lose their light. For when God fills us with spiritual fire, we stay in the heat of God's presence, thus enabling everlasting light to draw others to the love of Christ. Vanessa



Remembrance

As our Hockham war memorials show, we lost a number of Hockham men in WW1 and in fact a closer look shows that the memorial tablet that was originally in the Methodist Chapel has one extra name for 1914-1919 (people still died in 1919 from their injuries), the difference being a Mr Crawford who worshipped in Hockham but came from Stow Bedon, and he is also on their war memorial.

The 1939-1945 conflict had less Hockham people lost, 5 and just the main church war memorial lists those that did not return.

Cynthia Budd has researched and written about all of the fallen and many of those that returned from WW1. Copies of her work are in the church.

Also in the church is a lovely, illuminated scroll that lists all those from Hockham in the WW1 conflict, those in red marking the fallen. This was made and illustrated by Helen Downes one of the schoolteachers. One of my relatives is on that scroll.

The parishioners wanted to mark those that gave the ultimate sacrifice and began discussions on a war memorial, in fact the discussions went on for so long that the Methodists had their plaque made and unveiled first.

Reverend Spurgeon wanted the memorial at the church, whereas there was strong feeling that it should be on the village green. Eventually the Reverend won the day and along with a graveyard extension, the war memorial cross we stay silent at, at 11am on 11/11 was made from Portland stone and put in its place near the church gate in 1923.

The war memorial is listed grade 2 and the Hockham Parish Council are responsible for its upkeep. It's had to have a repair to a cracked arm of the cross and a good clean or two but is a permanent memorial and reminder of how conflict can affect so many families.

One story from WW1 is that in Autumn 1917 it was realised that stocks of cordite were dangerously low and imported raw materials were being targeted by German U boats.

Schoolchildren, including those from Hockham, were asked to collect acorns and conkers, which could be fermented to make acetone, a vital ingredient in cordite manufacture. Hockham had an abundance of acorns and a supply of these was collected and sold for 7 shillings and 6 pence for a hundredweight, to help the war effort. These went to Holton Heath in Dorset by train, where the factory was built for cordite manufacture.







Clematis (Part 3)

The dreaded 'wilt' disease, resistant varieties and a great group I forgot to mention in last month's part 2

The showy hybrids I mentioned in part 2 are wonderful to see in full cry but they have an Achilles' heel: a deadly disease called 'wilt'. As I mentioned in my part 1 piece, it can come from seemingly nowhere to destroy an otherwise large, healthy, well-established plant overnight. The causative organism - probably a fungus, but even now no-one is quite sure – attacks the large-flowered hybrids, which have a particular weakness to it, most likely from one of their far eastern ancestors. There is no cure and all preventive measures, such as they are, have patchy results at best.

But there is some hope: The *viticella* hybrids are largely immune and there are numerous to choose from. Over the past two centuries, the European *viticella* species was crossed and re-crossed repeatedly with imports and others and, although the flowers are markedly smaller than the large-flowered hybrids, they cover all the colours one might expect in the genus, and are far more numerous. There's even the odd double (*purpurea plena elegans and* 'Mary Rose' are the two that are normally mentioned). That last one is particularly interesting. Some authorities think it was one mentioned by herbalists in the time of Elizabeth I but was lost for centuries, before being rediscovered only a few years ago and given its current name.

The members of the group are usually listed as: Clematis *viticella*, followed by the individual cultivar name (e.g. 'Etoile Violette', 'Madame Julia Correvon', 'Alba Luxurians', 'Minuet' etc.) and any internet search will readily find them for you.

'Julia Correvon' is one of my all-time favourites and has a history similar, though shorter, than 'Mary Rose'. It was hybridised by a French grower in the late 1800s but it then disappeared completely before a slide of what turned out to be a sole survivor was recognised in the late 1950s on a presentation about National Trust Gardens. It is a showy, good-natured and thoroughly well-behaved clematis that has deservedly been brought back into general circulation.

I've not room to list all the different types that remain, but there are more than a few: The herbaceous clematis are good in a small garden where space is limited or you don't want a climber - heracleifola 'Wyvale' is a good one, which is slightly scented and can flower from June to September. Its flowers resemble clumps of hyacinth florets, the appearance of which can thoroughly perplex most gardeners coming across it for the first time.

The *alpinas* and *macropetalas* that I mentioned earlier are particularly good at scrambling through shrubs. So is the evergreen European, *cirrhosa balearica*, with its charming, small, bell-shaped flowers, flecked with reddish spots on the inside. Flowering from December to March, it goes dormant in late summer, losing most of its leaves and foxing many a gardener (and more than the odd nurseryman) into thinking it is dead or dying, to suddenly pick up, like Lazarus, around October and sail into flowering at the turn of the year as though nothing had happened.

Finally, to the Chinese evergreen, leathery strap-leaved species: *armandii*. It has a reputation for being 'difficult', so much so that it is especially cherished by growers and nurserymen, who have given it the dearest price tag, accordingly.

I'm devoting a bit more space to it here as, unlike in many other parts of the UK – including ones where I've tried to grow it - it seems to really like us in Great Hockham. I've a 3-year old plant which this March completely covered one side of the front doorway in dazzling drifts of white blossom. In case you think I'm blowing my own trumpet, it's not the only one I've seen in the village. There are three that are just as showy, if not more, though others are no doubt tucked away in back and side gardens that we can't see.

If you do give it a go, please get a named variety from a reputable grower or supplier. 'Snowdrift' and 'Apple Blossom' are the two that are normally recommended but, in line with its awkward reputation, it is tricky to get to grow from cuttings (the only way to keep any hybrid of this sort true to its name). For this reason, there are those out there that sell plants that have been more easily grown from seed, but this usually results in some very miserable, undersized flowers. (Incidentally, named hybrids of Wisteria often suffer the same fate.)

'They be nothing but runts, all', a grizzled grower once growled to me. And having seen some that have been raised in this way, I confess I had to agree with him.

MINUTES OF A MEETING OF HOCKHAM PARISH COUNCIL ON MONDAY 13TH OCTOBER 2025 IN HOCKHAM VILLAGE HALL AT 7.30PM

Attending, Cllrs, Lambert, Loft, Thomas, Leech and Lloyd, plus 11 members of the public.

- 1) Apologies for absence. District Cllr Cowen, Cllrs Bennett and Wiltshire
- 2) Requests for dispensation; none
- 3) **Declaration of interests**; Cllr Lambert as Landlord and owner of the Eagle and trustee of the Woodsford Charity, Cllr Loft as an allotment holder and Cllr Leech as a farmer at Little Hockham
- 4) **Minutes of the last meeting**; These had been circulated and were taken as read. Unanimously approved.
- 5) Progress Report.
 - a) Info board; In progress
 - b) NCC Highways. The drainage survey would be conducted. The highways engineer hoped to be present. Vicarage Rd access was being considered. The verge at Little Hockham Lane was being cut. Some work had been done on the trod but not enough. Road closure signage had been sourced for the council.
- 6) **Public Participation.** The meeting was adjourned for a while to take questions. Topics included indiscriminate and dangerous parking near junctions and plate glass in the bottle bank. The police would be contacted again regards the parking issues.
- 7) The clerk read the district councillors report, which included information on local authority reorganisation, devolution, the local plan and enforcement at Brookside Farm.
- 8) **Highways and Road Safety**; The damaged crossroads warning sign on the A1075 had been reported.
- 9) Planning: The parish council had responded along with other local councils on the enforcement notice at Brookside Farm. A new consultation was likely. There was a lively discussion on the land beyond Breakwell Close and the outline permission sought for 12 houses. It was felt that this was outside the settlement boundary and the local plan 5% ceiling of properties outside had already been breached. There were significant highways issues due to the closeness to the school. The parish council noted that their suggestions for moving the access road had been completely ignored by the potential developer, which was very disappointing.
 - The draft local plan had been discussed following the potential for 80 properties to the west of the school. Several conditions had been imposed including provision of a shop and utility capacity investigations. A public meeting would be convened during the consultation period, likely in November.
- 10) **Finance**; Payments were approved for the clerk's salary of £193. A big thank you to the village sign people was given and their invoice had been promptly settled. N Power had now invoiced all payments since February, and the amounts were low. The clerk congratulated the councillors for changing to LED lamps and saving the village large sums of money. There was £32,840.81 in the bank.

It was noted that the Woodsford Charity had invested most of close to £400,000 awaiting movement on land purchase for a new sports and community build. It was agreed to vote on keeping the precept at a similar rate as this financial year for 26/27 at the meeting on the 14^{th} Nov.

- 11) **Allotments**: The clerk advised that all allotment rents at Harling Rd had been paid. More land was likely required when available.
- 12) Footpaths and Rights of Way; No issues
- 13) **Playing Field,** Councillor Lloyd said the fireworks and bonfire would be on Sat 8th November. Help would be needed. There was £16053.in the bank plus a float of £600 awaiting fireworks
- 14) **Forest Edge Court**. Konnect bus were being taken over by another concern and discussion on a new stop could not be taken up until January,
- 15) 3-year Plan. The laptop was being sourced and the container being looked into.
- 16) **Poppy Appeal**; £250 was pledged for the appeal under s107 monies. Wreaths had been given by the British Legion and would be placed on 9th November at Shropham Church and 11am on 11/11 at Hockham Church.
- 17) **Councillor Update**: Congratulations were sent to a group of darts players at the Eagle who had raised £2334.71 for the Macmillan Charity.
- 18) **Correspondence**: The clerk advised that in order to comply with Assertion 10-Digital and Data Compliance, that email addresses would need to be .gov ones.
- 19) **The next full council meeting** would be Monday 24th November 2026 at 7.30pm. A Local Plan meeting would be convened before this, date to be arranged.
